And now a few words from me:

Hi, I'm Ody and I make patchy fur look good! I had a bad allergy flare-up when I came to CDRO that caused some hair loss due to a skin infection and all my scratching. But even before my fur started growing back, people just couldn't help but stop on the street to tell me how cute I am. I don't let my medical condition hold me back! For example, despite needing to be on a strict diet which consists of only my special dog food, I still try to treat the sidewalk like a free buffet! Sadly, my foster family is on to me and is good at preventing me from getting my paws on the yummy street treats.

In true Dachshund fashion I can be a wee bit stubborn, and I have a lot to say. I have thoughts and feelings on just about everything and you'd better believe I'm going to share them all! Whether I'm scared, excited, want something, don't like something, or feel any emotion, don't you worry, I'll keep you apprised via barks, whines, growls, or grumbles. My foster family says I'm way too chatty for apartment living. Hard to believe that everyone wouldn't want to know how I'm feeling all the time!

Once I get to know you, you'll see that I'm a snuggly guy. I like to curl up in a lap or beside you on my dog bed. I don't always need to be cuddled, but I do prefer to be where my people are. I must keep an eye on things and make sure that everything is under control. I try to do my part while my foster family is in the kitchen; I'm more than happy to make sure no dropped food stays on the floor for too long. But they don't seem to want my help, saying I'm "underfoot" and cannot eat things that drop because of my allergies, so I tend to end up in my x-pen during all the cooking fun!

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With all this nice weather, I'm showing my foster family that I really like going for walks. They were doubtful due to my distaste for rain and snow. I love to have my nose to the ground exploring, yell at the people walking by, and find adventure! My favourite thing to do, rain or shine, is burrow under my blankets and take a good nap. No wait... that's my second favourite thing to do. My favourite thing to do is eat! I love food so much. My foster family says I'm "food motivated" which makes me easier to train because I'll do anything for food. All I have to say about that is 'yum'! I also enjoy people watching and playing with toys, but I'm very particular. Fire hose toys are my favourite to destroy...ahem, I mean play with!

I cannot wait to meet my new family!

And now a few words from my foster family:

Ody could be described as a prickly pear when you first meet him. He tries to project a tough and prickly exterior but he is soft and sweet on the inside. He takes time to warm up to, and start to bond with, new people. It took a few weeks before we really started to see his personality and while we're still working on strengthening our bond, after a few months with us the true Ody is shining through. His future family should be prepared for a long transition period of weeks and likely months before Ody fully adjusts. However, he is a one-person kind of dog, so if you're lucky enough to be Ody's chosen person, the trust will come more quickly.

While in foster care Ody has exhibited mild resource guarding of his food and toys from other dogs. He is also reactive while on a leash and when new people enter the home. We believe a lot of this behaviour is due to Ody feeling insecure and trying to appear confident, along with never having been taught how to be a good doggy citizen. Ody is a master at working those puppy dog eyes, so he needs an experienced dog owner who can provide him with the structure he desperately needs, and continued obedience training to help build his confidence. These will go a long way in helping Ody to be the best dog he can be. His future family should still be prepared for this behaviour to just be part of who he is. It is highly recommended that he continues to follow a "Nothing in Life is Free" training method. We are currently using this method with Street Wise Canine.

We would lovingly describe Ody as a dog with a mild-to-moderate activity level and high medical needs. He came into our care with severe allergies that lead to a yeast infection in his skin, that in turn resulted in hair loss, skin irritation, and extreme itchiness. We are unsure of the allergen(s), or whether it is environmental or food related. However, with the help of a strict diet, medication, medicated baths, and regular use of a cone (much to his disappointment), his skin and overall health are improving. He has also developed ear tip vasculitis/canine ear margin dermatosis. It has not caused him any pain and treatment is greatly improving the symptoms. Further monitoring is needed to determine if the medication will be needed for life or just to treat flareups.

His adopter needs to be prepared for the additional time and expense that comes with his care. He will need to be followed closely by a vet and will likely require food trials or further allergy testing, in addition to regular medication. His future family should be prepared for other flareups of his allergies occurring throughout his life, that will require time and money to address (especially with his desire to eat whatever he can on his walks). Ody is currently working on muzzle training that will ultimately prevent his sidewalk snacking. He needs a home dedicated to keeping him healthy.
